The New Windsor Park

On 18th June, some nineteen members of Derryvolgie Men's Group were given a conducted tour of Windsor Park. This was the DVM final outing of this year's programme. For the non-sporting, Windsor Park is situated in south Belfast and is the home of the NI international football team. The stadium was built in 1905 but has been transformed in recent years into a large modern complex. The capacity of the football stadium is around 18,000 but the complex also contains a surprising range of other displays, meeting rooms, and corporate suites, many of which bring back

memories of heroes, goal scorers, managers, famous matches, etc.

We had the opportunity to look closely at the newly laid pitch and to sit in the dugout occupied by the NI management team during matches. ### **Pray for our Nominators**

As our Bishop, Diocesan Nominators and Parochial Nominators (Andrew, David, Noreen and Stewart) strive to seek out and appoint a new Rector, it is vitally important that we, as a church family, pray for God's input, wisdom, knowledge and guidance. Please pray continually and ask for the right servant to be placed with us.

Change is a part of life, and although there will definitely be a need for some extra patience and flexibility by everyone in our church family, we will get through this... especially if we follow these tips:

**1. Be Faithful to Attend Services** – The lack of a permanent Rector can make some of us feel less enthused or connected with our church family and may promote more frequent absences. However, if there was a time our church needed you, this is it! This is a time for us to increase our faithfulness in every area. We don't want to be fair-weather friends of the church... we want to remain faithful even during this uncertain time.

**2.** Be a Person of Prayer – People in our church must always be sincerely devoted to prayer... but even more so during this time when our church is without a Rector. If he can, our enemy, Satan will attempt to use the Rector's vacancy to incite mischief, conflict and discouragement in the flock, so prayer and spiritual vigilance is especially important during this time. Come on! Let's pray and stick together!

**3. Be Extra Patient and Understanding** – The interim period for our church may become tense and stressful, creating the possible atmosphere for any number of misunderstandings, so it is very important and helpful for everyone to add an extra seasoning of patience to our attitudes. Now that our Rector has moved on, following his calling, we, as a church family will discover the many things he did. We may notice that things may not run as smoothly as it once did... tasks may fall through the cracks or be forgotten about. It is not a time to find fault, but be understanding and pitch in and help make up the shortfalls. With God's help, we can Do It!

**4. Continue to Contribute Financially** – During a time of leadership transition, church finances can often become one of the first casualties to suffer... so it is vitally important for us to remain steadfast with our tithes and offerings. Remember, the tithe belongs to the Lord, continue to be faithful to Him, regardless of the changing nature of our church.

**5.** Volunteer More than Usual – Sometimes people look at changes in church leadership, as an opportunity to make changes of their own... perhaps to leave the church or to give up a position or responsibility. This is a critical time to step up and volunteer more than normal. Our church is not merely an agency to provide a service, our church is a relationship-based community, a family, where people serve and bless "each other" mutually... and it takes everyone's participation to make it work the way it should. Another way to look at it is... our church isn't as much like a restaurant, where customers are "served" and "pampered" ...but is more like a pot-luck lunch where everyone brings a dish to share with each other..... And we do love our Pot Luck Lunches!
