As required by the Church of Ireland during a vacancy, a surveyor appointed by Connor Diocese, carried out an inspection of the Rectory in May this year as no major renovation had been done in the 30 years since the house was built. The house was found to be generally sound but needed some maintenance and modernisation. Recommendations for the major works included replacing the kitchen and knocking the wall through to the dining room, with the installation of a steel beam. The bathroom, En suite and downstairs toilet were to be refurbished and internal walls at the



dormer window in the main bedroom should be replaced and insulated. Building Control subsequently directed that the electrical consumer unit should be upgraded. We were advised to redecorate from top to bottom and replace the internal doors. The opportunity was taken to replace the front windows and door; this had been previously approved by the Vestry but was postponed when the McElhinney family moved out about 3 years ago. The contract was given to a local builder who completed the work inside the house about a week after the Institution Service. Some minor snags and work to fencing has now been completed. Parishioners helped over two Saturdays to tidy the garden. The Rectory is now like a new house and we hope the Boyd family will be very happy in their new home for MANY years to come. The total expenditure totals nearly £42,000 which will be paid for by salary savings during the vacancy and from reserves held in Dublin.

My Day at the Synod



The Church of Ireland is divided into twelve dioceses. Derryvolgie is one of some 70 parishes in the Diocese of Connor. Each diocese holds an Annual Diocesan Synod. This year the Synod was held in Ballymena on 3rd October. The day began with Holy Communion in St Patrick's Church. St Patrick's has the most beautiful stained glass windows. At the Synod, the clergy of the diocese and lay representatives from each parish meet. The meeting is a kind of Annual General Meeting; those present hear reports on the activities of churches in the diocese. There is opportunity for some discussion.

The opening address was given by Bishop Alan, who was returning after a short period of leave. He referred to a book he has written and which is due for publication in the New Year. He said he had used his time off to reflect on a number of issues e.g. Brexit and the border; the plight of refugees in the world and the conflict between Christianity and culture in some countries. He complimented the work being done by the North Belfast Centre of Mission on the Shankill Road. The Bishop concluded by offering a challenge to each local church, namely, to continue their ministry as at present but also to find ways of being a source of help and relevance to those who don't belong to a church

The Report produced by the Diocesan Council was gone through. It included information on diocesan finances, developments in parishes, youth work, the church in the world and the Mothers Union. The evening session of the day included stories from 4 different parishes: Greenisland and African Child Ministry; Ardoyne and Alpha Course; St Aidan, Belfast and Messy Church; Ballymoney and "Filling Station". There was an opportunity to view displays from a number of diocesan and wider church projects and activities.

While there is a lot of administrative detail given at the Synod, this year it was heartening to hear about some very positive developments in parishes. Attending the Synod also helps to remind us that we are not just a local church but we are part of a bigger whole. **Derek Shuter**

This year, at a time when traditional use of Royal Mail reaches a peak, we will again be collecting used stamps. They can be placed in a box in the church hallway. The Leprosy Mission collects stamps from churches and supporters across Northern Ireland. Used stamps - 1st and 2nd class, are sold on to stamp collectors as kilo ware and this worthwhile charity receives around £10 - £15 per kilo. Stamp collections donated to The Leprosy Mission are purchased by collectors, who pay the market value for them. Over the course of a year £5,000 - £6,000 was raised in this way. Peter Hilton,

Church and Engagement Officer at Leprosy Mission NI, based at Queens Road in Lisburn said "It is an excellent supplement to the donations which we receive via collection boxes, regular gifts, annual collections etc., so please do collect your used stamps over Christmas for TLM! We are keen to make the most of every opportunity to raise funds that will help people suffering from leprosy to find healing and life in all its fullness."
