Bishop Alan Abernethy

The Bishop of Connor, the Rt Rev Alan Abernethy, has announced that he is to retire on 31st December 2019 on health grounds. Bishop Alan said that, following medical advice, he had taken this decision with 'a very heavy heart and spirit.' Breaking the news to the diocese of which he has been bishop for more than 12 years, the 62-year-old said it had been 'an amazing privilege and joy' to have served Connor as its bishop.



Bishop Alan was diagnosed with prostate cancer during a sabbatical in 2018. His treatment began early in November, and the bishop has taken part in a clinical trial, knowing this may

help others in the future. He announced his retirement on the day he had his final session of treatment. In a statement to the diocese, Bishop Alan said: "The last 12 months have been exhausting and it has been difficult to focus on anything other than my treatment plan. I have just received my last proton injection as part of the clinical trial and this stage of the journey is complete. I now need time to recover and regain my strength and energy. Having advanced prostate cancer means that I will be receiving quarterly hormone injections for the rest of my life and will have very regular check-ups with my oncologist. There are no guarantees, but it is hoped that I will be free of further treatment for years to come." The bishop concluded: "It has been an amazing privilege and joy to have served you as bishop."

As a parish we thank Bishop Alan for his ministry amongst us over these last 12 years and we wish him and Liz and their family every blessing. We also begin in earnest to pray for the process to elect a new Bishop with the preliminary meeting already having taken place we might see an appointment in early Spring.

Revision of the register of Vestry Persons

Each January we as a parish revise a list called 'Register of Vestry Persons.' What does this mean? This is an important and vital register to the successful running of our parish. It is a bit like being eligible to vote in an election. Having your name on the list does not mean that you are standing for an office/role in the church – it simply means you are eligible to vote for those who allow their names to go forward at our Easter General Vestry Meeting (AGM). So if you are new to the parish or are unsure whether your name is on it please speak to the Rector or one of the Wardens and they will be able to help answer your questions.

provide some outreach to the local community. We have been able to place a defibrillator in the Mace in Moss Road. Some parishioners will remember that this shop unit was the original location of St Columba's as a church. We are delighted to keep this historic connection. We have also been able to place a defibrillator in Froth Coffee Shop. Froth is used by numerous members of St Columba's. Our thanks to the staff of Mace and of Froth.

Visit Ulster Aviation Society!

In September, the Men's Group visited the Ulster Aviation Society Museum at the Maze. The museum is housed inside two large hangars. However, the outside appearance of the hangars gives no idea of the big variety of aircraft which is housed and maintained inside. We were surprised, to say the least, to see that the museum holds some 40+ aircraft. The Society is a charity but has managed to acquire a selection of aircraft e.g. fighter planes from WW11, planes designed by Shorts, transport carriers and a huge military helicopter. A model of the plane in which Harry Ferguson made his first flight over Newcastle beach has a prominent position. Our visit was made all the more interesting by the informative commentary provided by our guides. It was easy to understand why the Ulster Aviation Society museum is No.1 on Trip Advisor for Things to see in Lisburn. Our thanks to Andy for making the arrangements for this visit.

Blue Watch shows us around!

For their October outing, the Men's Society had a very informative and enjoyable visit to Lisburn Fire Station. The members of Blue watch were on duty on the evening of our visit. After an introductory briefing into the role of fire-fighting today, we were given a tour of the building, including the gymnasium, sleeping quarters, the engines and the command vehicles. We had the opportunity to see at first hand the various wheels, knobs and whistles and we were shown their uses The visit brought home to us that firefighters are a highly trained and closely knit band of men and women who, on a daily basis, deal with all kinds of traumas. We left, feeling that they are undoubtedly deserving of our best support.

City Cemetery comes to life!

Tom Hartley is an ex Mayor of Belfast. Now, his particular interest is in the cemeteries of Belfast. He is the author of several books entitled "Written in Stone." In these, he says that he tries to "bring to life" stories from the City Cemetery, Milltown cemetery and Balmoral Cemetery.

At the November meeting of the Men's Group, Councillor Hartley gave us a fascinating insight into the history of the City Cemetery in Belfast. We learnt that a wall had been built underground to separate the graves of different sections of the community. We saw slides of a variety of headstones and Gaelic crosses. We got an opportunity to understand the mix of denominations...... Jewish, Presbyterians, Church of Ireland, etc. Inscriptions on headstones showed us the varied backgrounds and life stories of some of those buried in the cemetery.....unionist politicians, military officers, business leaders, etc. Councillor Hartley's presentation gave us an insight into the history of Belfast and into local identity. His talk was different but fascinating. We all came away with something to think about. Our thanks to Joe for setting up the talk.
