Maureen was making a first visit back from her new home in Comber. Over a long number of years, Maureen had made a substantial contribution to the life of St Columba's.

In welcoming Maureen to the lunch, Derek Shuter spoke about her service. He referred to her work as Churchwarden. In the porch every Sunday, Maureen provided a friendly welcome to everyone arriving for the service. She was also a longstanding member of the Select Vestry and also a committed support to her late husband, John, in his role as Honorary Secretary. Derek pointed out that Maureen's contribution to church activities covered practically every function or activity which took place during the church year. The Toddlers Club on a Tuesday and the weekend Fab Club were just two activities which

benefitted from her willingness to help. In fact, a toddler who was a regular attendee on a Tuesday used to refer to the church building as "Maureen's house". There is no doubt that Maureen enjoyed her involvement in the running of church and in working to keep the building clean and welcoming. Making teas, washing dishes, dusting and cleaning (especially communion vessels), supervising young people, welcoming parishioners, and so on were all activities undertaken by Maureen...... and usually undertaken without being asked. We were pleased to present Maureen with a garden shrub as a small acknowledgment of her contribution to St Columba's.

Little did we know that this visit was to be Maureen's last to the church. We were shocked and saddened to learn of her sudden death at home in Comber on 12th January. We had the opportunity to pay our respects at the funeral service in St Columba's on 18th January 2022. Maureen was a character who is impossible to forget. She was: a caring person; a busy person; a respectful person. She was a person whose beliefs were lived out through her willing and practical involvement in the everyday life of the church. We give thanks for Maureen's life and example.

Our normal Christmas services continued both online and in person. Our children took

part in Christmas around the world – showing us the way the good news of Jesus is celebrated in different countries and cultures across the world. Our Community Carols continued to build on the success of the previous years and was a special way to mark the season with input from parishioners online and in person.









DerryVolgieKids

Since October, the kids' programmes at Derryvolgie have been delivered in person. A welcome change for those who were "Zoomed out"! The kids' programmes have been rebranded and now come under the "**DVK**" (Derryvolgie Kids) umbrella. DVK meets most Sundays; please see timetable included.

On Sundays we follow the "All Aboard" programme which was developed by the Diocesan Children's Worker. Each month there is a different theme, such as Old Testament prophets or women in the Bible. Each lesson includes a Bible story followed by some activities such as a game or craft to help the children delve into the meaning of the story.

DVK also meet on the first Friday evening of the month during school term time. On Friday evenings, primary school aged children enjoy games, craft, a Bible-based talk and a snack. There is a different theme each month, the theme for February is (very appropriately!) LOVE.

Thanks to all the DVK leaders and helpers for their commitment and care, making God's word accessible to the children that attend. Thanks also to the children for taking part, for being willing to learn and have some fun!

All primary school aged children are welcome to Sundays and/or Fridays. There is a registration form online to complete, but no booking is required. We would love to see you there.

NAKURU - You might have thought that Covid would have affected our collection for Nakuru. After all, more people might be attending our services, but they aren't all in church in person. They aren't there to drop some loose change in the collection plate on the way in. But thankfully they got it into that plate somehow! As a result, we were able to send a collection of £275.52 (40,219.59 Kenyan shillings) to Nakuru. Our donation goes to support the Nakuru Diocese school for orphans and the diocesan small business start-up fund. All the children from that school go on to higher education and most of the start-ups are formed by women. We couldn't be investing more wisely! The money goes a long way. The cost of living in Kenya is some 3.5 times less than it is here so that £275.52 will buy some £964 worth of goods. Your loose change is being very well spent!







You may already know me; my name is Mark Hassard and I am a Health & Safety Advisor for local Government. The first time that I attended Derryvolgie was in 1966 where I was baptised, I have had many positive experiences and fond memories there since.

Health & Safety is the golden thread that runs through the planning of any leisure or work activity, it is to minimise the risk and keep us safe. It is so important to remember there is risk in everything we do. The risk assessment process should be a positive "can do" approach to get things done, to consider anything foreseeable that could be encountered and to put in place sensible reasonable controls in order to keep us safe.

There is no shortage of strange decisions being blamed on health and safety. Over the years, the Health and Safety Executive has tackled some quite incredible myths about what health and safety bans or orders people to do:

- Children being banned from playing conkers unless they are wearing goggles.
- Office workers being banned from putting up Christmas decorations.
- Trapeze artists being ordered to wear hard hats.
- Pin the tail on the donkey games being deemed a health and safety risk.
- Candy floss on a stick being banned in case people trip and impale themselves.
- Hanging baskets being banned in case people bump their heads on them.



- Schoolchildren being ordered to wear clip on ties in case they are choked by traditional neckwear.
- Park benches must be replaced because they are three inches too low.
- Graduates ordered not to throw their mortar boards in the air.

It is hard to tell where some of these ridiculous and baffling myths originate, but they all have one crucial thing in common - they are not required by health and safety law.

The HSE have launched a new Myth Busters Challenge Panel, they have published its top ten worst myths, and if you are interested in myth buster reviews go to: www.hse.gov.uk/myth/top10myths.htm . They believe that the time has come to end the madness of silly!

COVID-19 has affected all of us in profound ways over the last year. Our leaders in the Big House on Hill have come together to keep us safe so far as reasonably practicable, but there has been a personal cost. The virus itself, and the necessary health and safety controls to contain its spread, have triggered feelings of anxiety, distress or loneliness for many of us. COVID-19 has affected us all in different ways, and it has been a worrying time. As the situation changes, we might feel nervous about the future or frustrated by the way our life has changed.

It is important to remember it is okay to feel this way and that everyone reacts differently. For most of us, these difficult feelings will pass. There are simple things we can do to help manage the way we feel, and take care of our mental health and wellbeing. Do not avoid things entirely, discuss any changes with your family, your church family and others; remember to tell someone how you feel. It's important to make time to relax, take part in or plan social occasions you feel comfortable with.

If I could offer advice to any of you today, it is to try to stay positive and to stick by your faith. Know that our God is with us and will take care of us, all the way through. *Mark*.

Communicating Clearly in Derryvolgie

In January 2020 the Select Vestry had taken the decision to upgrade our AV system, which in of itself seemed like a simple enough task. However, the raising of funds and the arrival of lockdown during the COVID pandemic put a hold on the installation.

While the pause button was pressed on the physical installation of equipment a new and exciting phase of ministry was launched in Derryvolgie. Our presence online was suddenly increased. Thanks mainly due to a superb volunteer team we were able to livestream our services, produce inspirational videos, hold Facebook live sessions, and collaborate with parishioners as we created a space to hear people's stories of hope and comfort.

As lockdown eased that September, we set about the

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physical installation of the new equipment that would enable us to continue our online presence as well as enhancing our in-person services. It was recognised and agreed that as we raised funds for this project it could be an opportunity to help others, looking out to our world as well as resourcing the mission of our parish. In a

conversation with Rev Stephen McElhinney (SAMS Ireland) we partnered with the Anglican Theological College (CEP) Santiago in Chile. This was to enable them to purchase new technology that would enhance how they train individuals for ministry in South America. This will enable them to develop a new media department to provide an online system for theological education and formation. Being able to provide quality recorded and live media for training church leaders and church planters will make a significant impact in a country which is 2653 miles long. The total cost of the project is around £14,000.

We had designated our harvest offering towards this project which gained a wonderful support of £3737 before Gift Aid. We obviously needed to raise more funds and that is where the idea of walking during June came from. We set out to walk 2653 miles during June, that is the length of Chile. We done it – in fact we

walked more than that. A team of 49 people pledged several miles per day some as young as 5 walking with others as old as (best not to speculate). It was wonderful to see the pictures coming in daily as we walked and prayed for our community and the nation of Chile. This project will have an impact for generations to come. Thanks to all involved in the walking we have raised over £4700 before Gift Aid. A wonderful achievement for a worthy cause that is already impacting our community as the equipment has enabled us to establish Life groups, children's and youth ministries online, live streaming funerals for family who can't attend and so much more. This is all before we get to the impact in the nation of Chile the fruit of which will not be seen for a few years, but we know will be huge under God.

It is great to be able say that during a 12 months period we have raised all necessary funds for this project and the monies handed over to SAMS on Sunday 26 September 2021.






Life Groups - One of the frequent questions around a life group is what do you do? Is it a bible study? A discussion group? Who leads it and what form does it take? Well, the answer is it really depends on the parish. So, what happens in life groups in Derryvolgie? They are a place where you can learn more, grow more and build deeper relationships with others. We are operating a hybrid system with some people meeting in person and others online. Everyone gathers at the same time, Tuesdays at 8.00pm. The Rector leads us in a simple re-cap of what he spoke about on Sunday taking it that bit deeper. Then we break off into our groups to discuss what has been said using a series of questions devised specifically for the evening. We currently have three groups and usually stay in the same groups (2 are online and 1 is in person) as this allows us to deeper our

relationships. We then return together for a conclusion and a chance to share any questions/comments that may have been raised. If you think this is something you would like to try, please get in touch with James.
